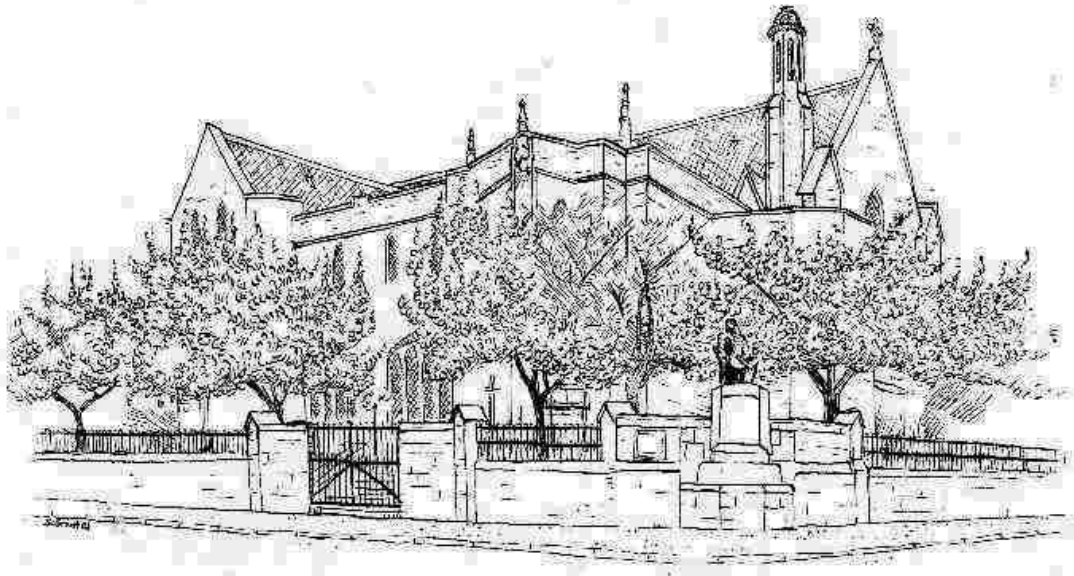

## **FORTHCOMING COMMUNION SERVICES**



The main quarterly celebration of the sacrament of communion will take place during our service the date of the next communion is to be confirmed.

While all are welcome to attend any of our services, a special invitation is extended to anyone wishing to attend our communion services.

The STATED ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation of RUTHERGLEN OLD PARISH CHURCH was held on Sunday 29th March 2026, immediately following the morning service.

Katie Morrison Locum opened the Meeting with prayer.

The Notice calling the Meeting, which had been intimated on Sundays, 15th March and 22nd March 2026 and signed by Katie Morrison Locum and the Clerk, was taken as read.

Minutes of the Stated Annual Meeting held on 23rd March 2025, and printed in the May 2025 edition of the Church Newsletter were taken as read and on the motion of Edith Duncan and seconded by Janet MacDonald were approved and signed.

### **The Treasurer's Report**

"As usual, I will keep this as brief as possible this morning, and assume you are familiar with the format by now. As well as the full version of our OSCR Accounts, you also have the single sheet summary and, on the reverse of that, the budget for 2026. The single sheet is simply a user-friendly summary of the Accounts.

Whether you look at the OSCR version of the accounts, or at the single sheet, the bottom line is the same. Once again, it is either good news or bad, depending on whether you are a glass half-full or a glass half-empty person. Our General Fund finished the year with a deficit of £3,269. Obviously, in an ideal world, we would prefer to balance our books or, indeed, finish with a surplus, and we did do that for many years prior to 2021. However, this is the second year in a row that we have reduced our deficit. In 2024, it was £7,579, so things are moving in the right direction, in spite of very uncertain times.

I remind you at this point that the £3,269 does not include Fabric Income and Expenditure, which I will deal with separately.

If we look at Income first, which increased overall by just under £1,343. However, this does not tell the whole story.

Open Plate increased by £153, which follows an increase of £719 the previous year, so that is actually quite significant. Total WFO increased by £1,352: Gift Aided donations rose by £2,500, while Non Gift Aided donations fell by £1,146.

Donations fell by almost £1,164. At this point, I'd like to express our thanks, in particular, to the Coffee Morning, the Guild, the Carpet Bowlers, the Scrabblers & Gathered Voices for their donations of £2,500, £300, £500, £100 & £350 respectively.

Can I just take a moment here to mention EasyFundraising? I don't think I've mentioned it for a couple of years. This year we received a donation of £86 from it. It may not seem much, but that is just a faithful 4 or 5 of us plugging away at it. It is often just a few pennies per transaction, although somethings like car or home insurance are more lucrative, but it does add up. Seriously, if you do any online purchasing at all, please see me about how you go about setting it up. It is very straightforward, and costs nothing!

Ok, now to get back on track. Gift Aid, i.e. the refunded tax received from HMRC decreased by £375. You may wonder why this decreased when Gift Aided WFO increased, so I think it is worthwhile reminding you at this point that, as well as claiming tax back on the Gift Aided WFO donations, we are also able to claim the tax on any anonymous donations of £30 and under through the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme, or GASDS for short. This covers most offerings given by WFO envelopes, which are not already Gift Aided, and donations by Open Plate. It also covers such things as donations in the Flower Fund box, donations at the Thursday Cafe and, of

course, any other small incidental donations that come our way. Use of Premises income increased by almost £2,000, part of this thanks to the Session House being hired out on a couple of occasions to outside agencies requiring a meeting space. Hopefully, word will spread, and we will get more of this type of Room Hire.

Unfortunately, interest was down this year by £608, due in part, to our once again having had to dip into our Reserves following the 2024 deficit, but also due to the downward trend in interest rates during 2025.

And now Expenditure.

Total Expenditure decreased by just under £3,000.

Giving to Grow was much the same, but Presbytery dues almost halved with a decrease of £1,636

The increase in Staffing costs, although it does include annual salary increases, is slightly exaggerated because of a payment of £700 Pulpit Relief costs received in 2024, which actually related to 2023. This meant our, 2024 Staffing Costs appeared to be less than they were.

Against the trend of rising energy costs, our Heating and Lighting expenditure decreased yet again, this year, by over £1,300. I appreciate that not everyone is in favour of our using the Greenhill Hall for some of our services during the winter months, although some do actually appreciate the intimacy of it. However, it is perhaps worth noting, that for the period 15/1/25 -12/2/25, when our services were held in the Greenhill Hall, our gas bill was £745.48. Compare that to £1,455.15 for the period 16/12/25 – 15/1/26, when most of our services were held in the Sanctuary. Granted the latter would have included an extra service on Christmas Eve, but I think it does still illustrate the financial benefit of having the services in the Greenhill Hall in the early months of the year. Ideally, we would love to worship in the Sanctuary every week but, unless we have a sudden influx of funds, we have to be realistic and do what we can to reduce our costs.

After an expensive year in 2024, the decrease of over £1,800 in Repairs & Maintenance is very welcome. The increase of £430, under Other Buildings, is due to rises in Insurance and Council Tax, and there is a small decrease of £151 in Other Costs.

And so, excluding Fabric, with total income of £66,342 and total expenditure of £69,611, we have finished the year with a deficit of £3,269. It is, of course, still disappointing that we have not at least managed to break even, but it is certainly yet another step in the right direction.

A few words on Fabric Fund.

As you can see, the Fabric Fund incurred a deficit of £2,377 during the year. Income included donations totalling £1,275 from the Thursday Cafe, which is really quite remarkable. You may remember we received legacies totalling £7,000 in 2024 which, as is our tradition, we put to our Fabric Fund. You can see from the closing balance in the Fabric Fund just how invaluable those legacies have proved to be.

As far as Expenditure was concerned, gutters were repaired and cleaned here at the church, and repairs were carried out on the Manse roof. Work was also carried out on the water heater in the downstairs kitchen, on the emergency lights in the church and on a drain at the Manse.

As I say each year, I hope that we have seen the last of the major expenditure on Fabric and, to a certain extent, there was nothing major this year. The most expensive repair was the church gutters but, as you will appreciate, it is the work involved in getting to that height that makes it costly, rather than the nature of the repair itself. So, again as I say each year, I think we can be fairly certain that both the church and the manse are in sound condition, and I am not sure that many congregations will have that peace of mind.

There is no doubt we have a difficult year ahead. We are all aware of the situation regarding our future in this building. However, to add to that, financially, we also have challenging times ahead. You will see from the budget for 2026, our Giving to Grow contribution has increased by over £4,500, despite the fact that we don't have a Minister. In fact, the only savings we will make on our not having a Minister are, hopefully, the Council Tax for the Manse (awaiting confirmed by South Lanarkshire Council) and car allowance. However, while the Manse is unoccupied, we are responsible for keeping a level of heating in it to avoid any risk of dampness. To make matters worse, we are not being given any allowance towards the cost of a Locum, or even Pulpit Relief. If a congregation cannot afford to cover these costs themselves, the Church of Scotland is expecting this work to be done on a voluntary basis. Yet again, we are so grateful and blessed to have Katie. One has to believe that God was at work when, back in 2021, she agreed to stay with us. It is not known where we would have been without her over the past four and a bit years' Once again, she has stepped up to the mark, and will conduct our worship for the foreseeable future.

Yet again, I am sorry this is not the report you would have wanted to hear, but I want to remind you that, in two years, we have gone from a deficit of £18,255 to one of £3,269. Considering the challenges we have faced and continue to face, this is no mean feat, and again, I acknowledge the generosity of those of you who have reviewed their offerings in the last couple of years. I am aware that times continue to be difficult for many, and I don't find it easy to say this, but I ask those of you who have not reviewed your offerings in recent years to consider doing so. "It is not too late."

#### **Appointment of Office Bearers**

Eight members of the Board due to retire but eligible for re-election are Mrs Irene Campbell, Ms Elizabeth Cunningham Mrs Kirsteen Dunn, Mr Jim Greig Mrs Janet Keenan, Mrs Karen Morris and Mrs Sandra Stevens they are all willing to be re-elected for a period of 3yrs but in light of the proposed union they will be elected for 1 year.

On the proposal of Robin Stewart and seconded by Hugh Millar. Mrs Irene Campbell, Ms Elizabeth Cunningham, Mrs Kirsteen Dunn, Mr Jim Greig, Mrs Janet Keenan, Mrs Karen Morris and Mrs Sandra Stevens were re-elected to serve on the Board for another year.

There remains, three vacancies to give us a full complement of Board members if anyone would like to join the board, they will be most welcome. The Board were given permission to co-opt members during the year.

#### **AOCB**

The Clerk informed the meeting that the Manse had now been vacated. Presbytery Property Committee will arrange to undertake a Manse Inspection in the near future.

#### **Vote of Thanks**

As is customary at the end of the Stated Annual Meeting, a Vote of Thanks is proposed, this was undertaken by Dr Janet MacDonald our Session Clerk.

Janet opened by saying this has been a year of uncertainty and change. In December we said farewell to our minister, and we are very grateful to our locum, Katie Morrison, for once again picking up the reins and keeping the life of the congregation running smoothly. Katie's sermons are always thought-provoking and remind us that God will show us the way forward. We have been fortunate in having Paul Cathcart (Deacon) as our Interim Moderator over the last few months, giving us the benefit of his insight and advice.

Janet continued to thank everyone involved in the life and work of the Old Parish for their support and commitment to the various organisation and activities.

This being all the business, Katie Morrison closed the meeting with prayer.

We are grateful to Jean Caldwell who arranges the distribution of the flowers which have been displayed in the Sanctuary. Thanks also to those who will deliver the flowers.

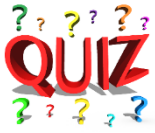
If you know of anyone who would benefit receiving the church flowers then please speak with Jean.
